

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS OF THE PROGRAMS OFFERED

5 Year B.B.A., LL.B. PROGRAM

A. OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAM

The 5 year Integrated Double Degree Program for B.B.A.,LL.B. is aimed at integrating the Legal Education as a major with the knowledge of Business Management Education as subsidiary. The mandatory courses in Law as prescribed by the Bar Council of India (BCI) are linked with the courses of Business Management in such a way that the study of these subsidiary management courses would enhance the understanding and interpreting the law in a better way in any given situation. Law as an instrument of social engineering, aimed at social change and social justice, requires proper understanding of various disciplines across the streams and subjects. With this view in mind the some basic courses in social sciences like Economics, Sociology are also integrated into the program. The course on Communication skills and Personality Development is also included as integral part of this program.

With the above objectives the 5 years B.B.A., LL.B. program is designed to include the following courses:

3 Year LL.B DEGREE PROGRAM

A. OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAM

The 3 year LL.B. Degree Program aimed at giving a comprehensive training in law and to equip the learner with Professional skills in understanding of various mandatory/optional courses in Law as prescribed by the Bar Council of India (BCI) and interpreting the law in a proper way in any given situation.

With the above objectives the 3 years LL.B. program is designed to include the following courses:

B. OUTCOMES OF THE PROGRAM

- The Post Graduates of Law will be able to acquire advanced theoretical and practical knowledge to take up legal profession in any Higher Courts of law as well as in any other Special Tribunals in the Country.
- The Post Graduates of Law will be able to gain sophisticated knowledge as required to discharge the duties of higher judicial offices.
- The Post Graduates of Law will be able to get analyse research problems and application skills required to work as Research Scholars in any University or as legal advisors in any organisation.
- The Post Graduates of Law will be able to synthesize and evaluate the knowledge obtained by them which will help to develop an aptitude for higher learning and research in different areas of law.

C. ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

I. DURATION OF THE PROGRAM

- The duration of the LL.M program shall be One Year in two semesters, with minimum of 30 contact hours in each week and eighteen weeks for each of the two terms including class room teaching, library work, seminars and research;
- The entire program shall be spread evenly for the duration of the programme, with 13 credits in each

III.ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION:

The candidate should have passed Intermediate examination or its equivalent in a regular stream (10+2) with a minimum of 45% marks. Relaxation of 5% marks will be applicable to S.C., & S.T., candidates.

IV.SELECTION PROCEDURE:

Students who have qualified and obtained ranks in CLAT or State Level LAW CET -2016 are eligible for

The tuition fee per semester shall be: Rs. 50,000. (Rupees fifty thousand only). Scholarships will be awarded to deserving students.

VI.DETAILS OF COURSES OFFERED

The LL.M Program structure/curriculum shall have the following components:

- i) Foundation/Compulsory Courses (3 Courses three credits each)
- ii) Optional/Specialization Courses (6 Courses with two credits each)
- iii) Dissertation (five credits)

VII.COURSE WORK AND ATTENDANCE:

1. The registration of a candidate is valid for a period twice the prescribed duration of the program from the date of registration.
2. A candidate shall be deemed to have eligibility to appear for end-semester exams in any course if the student has attended a minimum of 70% of classes held in the course concerned, including the moot-court exercises, tutorials and practical training conducted in the course.
3. If any student for any exceptional reasons fails to attend 70% of the classes held in any course, the Principal of the College may allow the student to take the exam, if the student concerned attended at least 65% classes held in the course concerned and 70% of the classes in all the courses in entire semester taken together.

VIII.EVALUATION:

The performance of a candidate in each semester shall be evaluated course-wise, for a maximum of 100 marks per course, on the basis of Comprehensive Examination at the end of the semester and internal continuous evaluation.

- A Surprise Test is of objective or subjective nature decided by the faculty concerned and is conducted without prior intimation. There will be two such tests in a semester.
- Home assignments (Written) are given in each course by the faculty member concerned. There will be one assignment in each semester in each course. The assignments shall be submitted before the deadline fixed by the respective faculty member. The defaulter shall lose marks allotted for that assignment.
- Class attendance is monitored by each faculty member and based on the percentage of attendance; marks are awarded by the faculty member concerned.
- In order to maintain transparency in evaluation, the answer sheets of all components of continuous assessment should be shown to the students within one week of conducting the tests. If a student is not convinced with the marks awarded he/she can apply for recheck. However, the student can apply for recheck on the day of returning the answer sheet within the classroom only.
- The evaluation of courses like practical training, internships, moot courts and court attendance will be based on the diaries and project reports

the student in all credited courses and credits attached to it. It is the weighted average of the grade points of all the letter grades obtained in credited courses by the student from his entry into the University. CGPA is computed as follows:

- g) To convert *CGPA* into equivalent marks a multiplication factor of 9 is adopted. Ex: *CGPA* 7 is equivalent to $7 \times 9 = 63$ marks.

XI. REPORTS/GRADES

The Course Coordinator can award the following Reports/ Grades depending on the cases:

- a) Grade forms **X, A, B, C, D, E** and **F** are awarded to the student if the student satisfies the corresponding requirements as specified above.

- b) **NA** (Not attended) is awarded to the student if the student has shortage of attendance. When student is given **NA** the candidate has to repeat the course. It should be noted here that **NA** is different from **F** grade. For a student with **F** grade his/her marks obtained in internal evaluation component will be carried forward. While for a student awarded with **NA** Report, the candidate has to reregister for such course/s and attend the classes by paying the prescribed fee.

- c) **RC** (Registration Cancelled) is awarded to a student for various reasons specified by the university including examination malpractice cases. Such a student will have to re-register for the course in subsequent

XII. AWARD OF DEGREE:

A Candidate shall be eligible for the award of **B.B.A., LL.B.** Degree, if the candidate satisfies the minimum

semester/summer term whenever the course is offered.

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A Candidate shall be eligible for the award of **LL.B.** Degree, if the candidate satisfies the minimum academic requirements in every course. The degree will be awarded only to candidates who obtain minimum CGPA of 5. The **LL.B.** degree with second class will be awarded to those having $CGPA \geq 5.5$ and above up to $CGPA < 6.5$. The degree of first class will be awarded to those having $CGPA \geq 6.5$ and above up to $CGPA < 8$. The degree of first class with distinction will be awarded to candidates having $CGPA \geq 8$.

XIII. WITH-HOLDING OF RESULTS:

If the candidate has not paid dues to the University or if any case of indiscipline is pending against him, the result of the candidate shall be withheld and he will not be allowed/ promoted into the next higher semester. The issue of degree is liable to be withheld in such cases.

XIV. CHANGES IN THE RULES OR SYLLABI:

1. The University may change or amend these rules or syllabi at any time and the changes or amendments shall be made applicable to all students on rolls with effect from the dates notified by the University.
2. The Examination Malpractice Rules shall be as prescribed by the appropriate authority of the University.

If the candidate has not paid dues to the University or if any case of indiscipline is pending against him, the result of the candidate shall be withheld and he will not be allowed/ promoted into the next higher semester. The issue of degree is liable to be withheld in such cases.

XIV. CHANGES IN THE RULES OR SYLLABI:

1. The University may change or amend these rules or syllabi at any time and the changes or amendments shall be made applicable to all students on rolls with effect from the dates notified by the University.
2. The Examination Malpractice Rules shall be as prescribed by the appropriate authority of the University.

XV. GENERAL UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS

In cases not covered by the above Academic Regulations, the common Academic Regulations of the University shall apply.
